Family Camp 2023

Following the return of Family Camp last year, we thought it would be great fun to do it all again!



Once again we have managed to secure exclusive use of:

Dilston Scout Campsite near Hexham

Friday 26th to Sunday 28th May

Those who attended last year will tell you that this is an absolutely brilliant location for a family camp. We have sole use of a huge flat field with a river running through it. There are hot showers and plumbed toilets on site too!

All Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Explorers, siblings, parents, guardians, grandparents and friends are welcome to come along.

The price will be £45 each for anyone 6+ and £10 for siblings under 6 years old, and will include all your meals from Saturday breakfast through to Sunday lunchtime.

We will accept unaccompanied Scouts on camp with us. We'll place them in a patrol with a family for the weekend and they can camp in our group patrol tents with any other scouts who might not want to camp with their families; mums and dads can be so embarrassing. We'll also accept unaccompanied Explorer Scouts for the weekend. They have the option to join as participants or as members of our service crew, where they will help us run activities and generally keep the place running smoothly.

We are not able to accept camper vans or caravans. We have a limited number of patrol tents we may be able to lend you on a first come first served basis. Just ask. The site does not allow dogs.

All adults staying overnight will need to have a Scout DBS completed (if they do not already have one) before camp. We will check whether you have a current DBS when you book and get in touch if you need a new DBS or a renewal.

Rather than rely on a lot of bank transfers, we are going to take card payments for this event. Once we've confirmed your booking and all adults in your party have a valid DBS we will send you payment info.

This is your chance to come along and join in the sort of fun camping activities we'd normally save to do with our Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers — we hope to see you there!





1st Barton has been around since 1977, and even though 46 years is a long time, we were nowhere near being the first group in Richmondshire Scout District.

We do get to claim at least one First though; we were the first group in the district to have a Beaver colony back in the late 1980s, in a time when HQ decided that the most exciting colour they could put our youngest section in was grey.

Well here we are in 2023 with our Beavers clad in a much more exciting uniform and we are ready for another first. When we return from the Easter break we will be welcoming some 4-6 year olds into Richmondshire's first ever Squirrel Drey. And they won't be grey Squirrels either!

In 2021 Scouts began a pilot project to test out an early years provision (called Hedgehogs at the time) to see whether it would work. Since the end of the pilot more than 350 groups around the country have started their own Squirrel Drey and we are really proud to be the very first in our district.

No section in this group can operate without volunteers and we are really glad to have Christine returning to lead a section and assemble a team of willing and able helpers to make our new section a huge success. Thanks for the work so far, Christine and the team. This is going to be quite a ride.

For those of you with 4-6 year olds on the waiting list, don't worry if you didn't get an invitation to join Squirrels. We picked young people who would be able to stay with the Drey for more than 6 months, so we left out some of the older ones on the waiting list. They will still be offered a place in Beavers in line with our waiting list policy, so nobody will be adversely affected by not having a place in our youngest section.

So when you see some little red Scouts lining up to join us on a Monday night before Cubs, don't worry, it's just Richmondshire's newest Squirrel Drey.

Parent Portal and Subs

We use an online system called Online Scout Manager to keep records of our young people. Some parts of those records, such as badge progress, are available for parents to view. Others, such as contact details and Gift Aid declarations are available for parents to update. We'd love it if you could take the time to drop in there and make sure everything is up to date, particularly email addresses. We get a surprising number of bounced emails. A link to Parent Portal can be found at the bottom of our website, bartonscouts.co.uk

You will have originally accessed Parent Portal when you set up subs, but if you forgot your password you can reset it on the home page of Parent Portal using the email address you have provided.

On the subject of subs, they are charged at £120 per year, split into 12 equal payments of £10. There are a few people out there who have still not clicked the link to set up subs. If you are having trouble, get in touch and we will sort it out. Be aware that if you do sign up late, the system will immediately take all back payments owed.

No young person will be denied scouting on the grounds of money. Just get in touch and we will arrange something with you. Failing to sign up for subs is not the best way to handle payment problems. We'd also ask that if you are withdrawing your young person from scouting that you get in touch with your section leader before cancelling your DD. We can do this promptly and it's nicer all round if we don't say our goodbyes via the banking system.
