Scouts Expedition 2023

"When everything seems to be going against you, remember that the airplane takes off against the wind, not with it." — Henry Ford

2023 is the second time we have run the Scouts Expedition challenge. It should happen every other year, but the pandemic put paid to any chance of running a 2021 version. In preparation for this year's edition I found the notes for the briefing we give to the teams in July 2019 just before they set out on day one. Point 3: "Possibility of thunder storms."

You'd get long odds on the same thing happening 4 years later, but there we were, two days before the start, looking at some grim and stormy forecasts. It wasn't until the morning of the first day that we actually decided to go ahead. Unfortunately it was one of those rare times when the forecast was completely correct.

Day one saw one team starting in Piercebridge, walking south, and another starting in Moulton, walking north. The plan was for them to meet in Melsonby at the end of the day and camp in the field, and then on day two they would walk in the opposite direction. The teams were unaccompanied (but monitored) and happily their navigation was really good. No-one used their emergency radio, or needed to call a leader for help. That's despite the weather throwing an horrendous summer storm at them.

The teams took between 4 and 5 hours to complete the day and arrived at the field wet, but happy to be done for the day. All that remained was the small matter of pitching tents, setting up a kitchen and cooking dinner. All of this passed without much incident, although one team will be sure never to pitch with their tent door into the (very strong) wind again.

Dinner was cooked and eaten at a rapid pace and the rest of the evening was spent under the parachute, round the fire getting good and smoky. There was no noise at all after bedtime. Maybe the teams were tired out, or maybe the ongoing wind and rain was blocking out a party at the bottom of the field. We'll never know.

The morning saw a huge change in the weather and after a slightly groggy breakfast the teams set of on their final leg without the need for waterproofs. The weather must have put a spring in their step because both teams finished ahead of the earliest estimate we gave them without major incident. Did some people veer off route over the two days? Yes. Do some people have a better appreciation that their waterproof jacket isn't? Probably? Are we proud of everyone? Absolutely.

This is a great example of us allowing our Scouts to go out, with the skills we have helped them learn, and do something independent for a couple of days, resolving their own problems as they go. They have had a much harder weekend than they would have had on a nice warm July weekend, but in overcoming the extra adversity they have achieved so much more.
