# **Group Scout Leader Report**

We've had another trip round the Sun and I am writing another AGM report. This one comes less than 11 months after the last "annual" meeting as we try to gradually creep them forward in the calendar closer to the end of our financial year. I hope the temptation of a bit of model car racing has grown our audience from an single parent in 2022 to enough people to make it standing room only, and that word of mouth and increased Pinewood Derby entries means we have to rent out the function rooms at the Dolphin Centre next year.

It's been another busy year, but the absolute highlight has to be opening the first Squirrel drey in Richmondshire district. In little over 6 months we went from running a mile at the mention of

Squirrels to opening our doors to 4-5 year olds. As with so much in the group, I can only take credit for some of the admin; the real credit here goes to Christine and her team for getting this off the ground and running with it since Easter. There's lots more about what they have been up to in Christine's report, so I won't say anything except how proud I am of the way they went about the challenge and the way things are running. Thanks to the whole team.

Family Camp 2023 was another success. Numbers were down on 2022 due to several factors. The event gets a year off in 2024 to allow us to concentrate our efforts on other events. We'll be back in 2025.

Numbers across all our sections remain stable - and full - with the exception of Scout which has seen a



dip to the lowest numbers we have seen in a long time. This is not a huge cause for concern as we have full sections below us and they will feed new members to us in good time.

Our partner Explorer Scout unit, Half Moon, has gone from strength to strength and they currently outnumber our Scouts. They continue to be fantastic role models to our younger sections and give them something to aspire to as they move through the sections. We're grateful to so many of them for volunteering as Young Leaders across our sections and showing our Squirrels, Beavers, Cubs and Scouts what a great family the group is.

I am delighted to be able to present some Chief Scout's Gold Awards at the end of the meeting tonight. This is a rare privilege and to be presenting more than one is a real rarity and testament to the tenacity of a cohort of Scouts who worked through the pandemic to achieve their goals.

In the next 12 months there will be a couple of things that loom large in terms of events. In July North Yorkshire Scouts will hold their first Jamboree since NYJAM in 2009. Larkin promises to be a memorable week and we are already planning towards it with lots of our volunteers offering to give up their leave from work to support it. Bookings are open for Scouts and Explorers and more information will come out to the younger sections in due course.

Most years come with some sad goodbyes and 2023 was no different. Except it was, because this year we said goodbye to our Bell Boats. They had served us well for 12 years but were sadly not getting used as much as they used to, so taking into account the cost of upkeep and insurance and difficulties with storage, we took the decision to sell them. Don't worry, they didn't go far; our County water team took them off our hands, so we'll be reunited with them at some point in the not too distant future.



I'll close with a few words of thanks.

Thanks you to the volunteers who make this happen. The ones in uniform you see every week. The ones who make administration a less onerous task. The ones who fetch and carry our gear. The ones who maintain our equipment and property. The ones who build the madcap bits and bobs that pop into my imagination. The ones who come and make delicious food at our events. Everyone who committed any little bit of time throughout the year, thank you.

It was also a special occasion as Izzy, our joint gang show choreographer and cubs helper made the next step in her scouting life as she took on a unformed role.





From April to July we spent every troop night outdoors doing those typical scouty things with fires, backwoods cooking, honing tracking skills and perfecting bearings.

With the skills practised in the early year, the scouts put their experience to the test as they planned and completed a weekend expedition.



We've introduced some new activities to the programme and enjoyed the Barton version of the Houses of Commons and enjoyed some interesting discussions when we had a life auction.

We are so lucky to have access to such a wonderful outdoor space at the Melsonby field, we know that exposing children to natural habitats and particularly woodland are associated with enhanced cognitive development and mental health benefits. We started the year with 23 scouts and ended the year with 17, which is the lowest troop size we have had in many years. But, this has given us the opportunity to run programmes which allow children to have their voices heard, the leadership team to take a more flexible approach and ensures that everyone has the freedom to engage, interact and practice.

We have had the pleasure to send a record number of scouts up into the Half Moon Explorer Unit. I'd say we're doing something right as some of this young talent in the Unit will one day be reinvesting their time into scouting, volunteering to help shape our future generations of scouts.
